### Catholic School Pupil Profile Eloquent and Truthful

This week, pupils were introduced to the focus value and virtue pairing that we have as part of the Catholic School Pupil Profile—Eloquent & Truthful:

**Eloquent:** the ability to speak or write fluently, persuasively and appropriately. We are eloquent when we use language to express our ideas or opinions clearly and with conviction. When we choose our words, we should do so carefully so they are kind and compassionate, and don't hurt others. Eloquence isn't limited to speaking and writing. We can express ourselves in other ways like music, drama, painting or dance. We should use our creative gifts to say things in a way that is interesting, truthful, memorable and faithful.

**Truthful:** God wants us to be truthful in all we do. Jesus said, 'I am the way, the truth and the life', so being honest and truthful means we are following in his footsteps and living life the way God wants us to. Being truthful is being faithful to ourselves and to Jesus. We should stand up for the truth.

In assembly, we discussed what eloquence and truthfulness looks like. We explored the example set by St. Oscar Romero, who spoke out for the rights of children and the wrong things that were taking place in El Salvador.



## The Feast of the Epiphany

### <u>PE Kit</u>

Please ensure that on PE days, pupils wear dark tracksuit bottoms or leggings (not spotty, striped, flowery ones), a white polo shirt and their **school jumper**. Football shirts, for example, are not acceptable. Pupils who arrive in school wearing unacceptable clothing for PE will be asked to change in to spare clothing which we have in school. We have high expectations in school and this needs to be reflected in the way that pupils respond to school rules. Thank you for your support.

#### **School Uniform**

A polite reminder about school uniform please. Pupils from Y1 upward should be wearing the winter uniform of a hard collar shirt and tie, grey trousers or a skirt, a royal blue jumper and black school shoes. Long hair should be tied back and jewellery should not be worn apart from stud ear-rings. We have plenty of pre-loved uniform which is in good condition if this helps. I know that uniform can be expensive and I do try to ensure that I supply as much as I can leaving items in the playground throughout the year and passing things on upon request. Being smart for school is important as it teaches pupils the value of themselves and their school. It also prepares pupils for their secondary education where non-compliance with standards results in detention and other consequences.

Keep your personal information safe. When chatting or posting online don't give away things like your full name, password or home address. Remember personal information can be seen in images and videos you share too. Keep them safe to keep yourself safe.

Meeting up with someone you only know online, even a friend of a friend, can be dangerous as this person is still a stranger. If someone you only know online ever asks you to meet up, for personal information or for photos/videos of you then tell an adult straight away and report them together on www.thinkuknow.co.uk

Think carefully before you click on or open Ξ something online (e.g. links, adverts, friend requests, photos) as you never know where they may lead to or they may contain viruses. Do not accept something if you are unsure of who the person is or what they've sent you.

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You cannot trust everything you see online as some things can be out of date, inaccurate or not entirely true. To find reliable information compare at least three different websites, check in books and talk to someone about what you have found.
